Challenging Your Reporting Condition

If you are currently being asked to report or sign at a Home Office centre or police station regularly (e.g. every week or every month), this means that the Home Office has imposed what's called a "reporting immigration bail condition" on you.

Did You Know?

- Any reporting condition imposed needs to be appropriate according to each person's circumstances
- The Home Office does not have to impose reporting condition - there are other options available particularly if reporting condition is not appropriate
- Check if your reporting condition is appropriate. See next page

Below is a simple checklist when considering whether your reporting condition is appropriate. This checklist <u>provides only an indication because much depends on</u> <u>specific circumstances.</u>

	Yes or No?	If Yes, provide details
Is your reporting condition more than once a week?		
Do you have any disabilities or ongoing medical conditions (whether mental or physical) , which are worsened during reporting events?		
Do you have to use Asylum Support money in order to go to your reporting event?		
Does it take more than 1 hour of public transport to go to your reporting centre?		
Do you have children who you have to bring to reporting events?		
Are you supported and accommodated by social services?		
Are you a child (under 18)?		
Are you a victim of trafficking? Put yes if any of the below applies:		
 You been referred to the National Referral Mechanism and have received a positive reasonable grounds decisions Your have a support worker from charities such as Hestia, Medaille Trust or The Salvation Army 		

If any of the answers above is yes, it is possible that your reporting condition is not appropriate. Please seek advice either from your immigration solicitor or from an advice agency in your area
